Micro Lipo

Treatment for acne

A study recently published in *The Lancet* details how over the counter (OTC) **benzoyl peroxide lotion** is as good as prescription antibiotics in the treatment of mild to moderate facial acne. The study compared various oral and topical antibiotics, and the results revealed that the cheapest treatment, benzoyl peroxide, was 12 times more cost-effective than the oral antibiotic, minocycline.

No correlation between meat and cancer



According to the **Institute of Food Technologies**, a recent food study, published in the *Journal of the American Medical Association*, is "inconclusive," because it did not completely review all the food-risk factors that are considered to influence the risk of contracting cancer. IFT says the study failed to include data from its participants' family history of colon, rectal, breast or other cancers. The recent study also dismisses the meat/cancer link, and references other reputable studies that show no correlation between the consumption of meats and an increased risk of getting cancer.
